St. Mary's – St. Mark's – All Saints' – St. Nicholas

Candlemas 1st February 2026

Reading for this Sunday: Hebrews 2, 14 to the end

Gospel Reading: Luke 2, 22 - 40

²² When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), ²⁴ and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.' ²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. ²⁷ Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, ²⁸ Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying, ²⁹ 'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; ³⁰ for my eyes have seen your salvation, ³¹ which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, ³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.' ³³ And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. ³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed ³⁵ so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.' ³⁶ There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, ³⁷ then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. ³⁸ At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem. ³⁹ When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. ⁴⁰ The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

Almighty and ever-living God,
clothed in majesty,
whose beloved Son was this day

REFLECTION

Malachi 3: 1-5, Hebrews 2: 14- 18 Luke 2: 22-40

Today we have a succession of readings that carry us through the Presentation of Christ to human kind. Malachi, tiring of his people's unfaithfulness to God announces that a day of judgement will appear. The Lord will send a messenger. He will have human qualities of skill, using work images to announce Godly images. The Lord will pronounce judgement on those who do not respect him.

Luke has begun to illustrate the earthly mission of Jesus. It is seen through the eyes of the faithful old. We who are old (in years at least!) will recognise that moment of a child being shown to his family, and we wonder, how will he or she develop? What are our own hopes and fears? How much of their lives will we enjoy? Simeon and Anna present a tender and yet powerful image. Simeon narrates the prayer of our own familiarity, "Now Lord let your servant depart in peace, according to your word....." Remember as he spoke these words the embryonic parents were listening and wondering, in both senses to what this all meant. There was for Mary the image of the sword and its purpose. Meanwhile Anna in faithfulness attended each day and in her widowhood of great length also receives this child with joy.

The message of this story was that it was not just for the people of Israel but for everyone, folks just like you and me. In our personal expression of faith these passages of scripture might become a pattern for our own use. It might be especially helpful when we embark on our Lent courses. We will each bring different images of faith, being the Annas and Simeons, or the intercessors and those who secure our lives with their prayers.

I haven't forgotten Hebrews. The author emphasises Jesus' humanity. He had to come, it is written, "That he became like his people in every way, in order to be their faithful and merciful High priest, so that their sins could be forgiven. And now he can help those who are tempted because he himself was tempted and suffered."
