**22 February 2026 – First Sunday of Lent**

**Reading for this Sunday is:** Romans 5, 12 – 19

**Gospel Reading:** Matthew 4, 1 - 11

Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. <sup>2</sup> He fasted for forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished. <sup>3</sup> The tempter came and said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread.' <sup>4</sup> But he answered, 'It is written,

"One does not live by bread alone,

but by every word that comes from the mouth of God."

<sup>5</sup> Then the devil took him to the holy city and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, <sup>6</sup> saying to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down; for it is written,

"He will command his angels concerning you",

and "On their hands they will bear you up,

so that you will not dash your foot against a stone."

<sup>7</sup> Jesus said to him, 'Again it is written, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test."

<sup>8</sup> Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendour; <sup>9</sup> and he said to him, 'All these I will give you, if you will fall down and worship me.' <sup>10</sup> Jesus said to him, 'Away with you, Satan! for it is written,

"Worship the Lord your God,

and serve only him."

<sup>11</sup> Then the devil left him, and suddenly angels came and waited on him.


**Collect**

## REFLECTION



On the wall in my study, I have certain pictures, documents and other items which mean something to me. I have some framed certificates reminding me of the significant stepping stones of my life. I have one or two group photographs of past gatherings with colleagues and friends; and I have the inevitable pictures of loved ones. As I look around the walls, they all transport me to bits of what I am.

I have long cherished a small book I first read whilst at Theological College called *“Becoming What I Am”*. The book is

a compilation of short talks given by its author (Fr. Harry Williams) about *prayer*. I liked the book because it was simple and down to earth, and I have re-read it many times over the years. It talks to me about *where I was...* and not necessarily as if I was already *“there”*. A young ordinand appreciated that kind of approach...and I still do!

Not without humour, the book used the day to day experiences of life - the important and the trivial - to illustrate great truths about the *“spiritual”* that are common to us all. It also had a title that caught my eye! By using the word, *“becoming”* the author pointed to a journey to a future point. But by qualifying it with, *“Becoming...what I am”* we are reminded of the futility of always looking for some distant peak of spirituality to which we shall all doubtless ascend ‘one day’...if we do our homework!

This ought to be the attitude to accompany us into the season of Lent. ***Do not*** adopt airs and graces about what you ought to be. ***Do not*** enter it with unrealistic expectations of your own application to rigorous routines. ***Do*** give yourself one or two simple goals; and ***do*** come regularly to church to be with God and his other very fallible people. In other words, enter it with *simplicity* and *openness...* and you will not be disappointed at its end. It’s a bit like life really!
