#### **Rev Natalie Davies writes:**

This issue of the magazine covers a bumper two months in the church calendar where we journey through Advent to Christmas and Epiphany, with the next issue coming out at the beginning of February, just in time for Candlemas which officially marks the end of the Christmas season.



**But as I write this article**, we have just celebrated Remembrance, honouring the fallen, all those who have given their lives in the service of this country, in striving for peace. Remembering the past year as we approach the end of it, we will be no doubt be mindful that another year has passed in which the yet more conflicts have broken out or continued across our globe.

Advent is a time in the liturgical calendar of waiting and preparation. We are waiting for Jesus, the light of the world and bringer of peace to come into our lives. This year this waiting is again more poignant than ever.

However, as we mark the start of Advent at the evening Advent Sunday service at St Mary's, beginning with darkened church which is gradually lit with candles, we will be reminded that the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it (John 1:5). Wars continue because there are those who continue to resist evil, who are determined to bring freedom to those who are persecuted and to return peace to places torn apart by violence. During Advent we wait and look toward the coming of the light into the darkness, the root of Jesse, Emmanuel, God with us who was born of the Virgin Mary and sent by God as the saviour of the world. Christ is our hope and our light in the darkest of times.

**Moving through Advent,** closer to Christmas the Church offers us a set of prayers to be used to herald the coming of Christ. The Advent O Antiphons have been used since the early Middle Ages and have

been sung since the sixth or seventh centuries at Evening Prayer between 17th-23rd December. Each are drawn from a description of the Messiah from the Old Testament prophets and concludes with a plea- Veni! 'Come!'. Together these offer us a profound and beautiful meditation on the coming of the Messiah.

O Wisdom, O Adonai, O Root of Jesse, O Key of David, O Morning Star, O King of the Nations, O Emmanuel, Come! (and if you want to read more about this and how to pray with these, I highly recommend to you O Come Emmanuel: Reflections on the Advent Antiphons which has been recently published by Church House Publishing).

In calling the O Antiphons to mind we can look in joyful expectation to the celebration of the birth of Christ, our light and our salvation, who has so much to offer us today. Because despite all the darkness in our world, there is still much that has happened in which we have been guided and accompanied by Christ that we can be thankful for and celebrate:

This year across our churches we have seen: nine couples married, two of our choristers confirmed, baptisms, the licensing of Revd Dave and Carol Richards at St Marks and Revd Tony Edmonds in Studland; All Saints have had two very successful community Fundays and have seen the successful launch of the new Toddler Group, a Holy Week prayer room, hosted a work experience student, and held many other successful services and events; St Marks had two excellent Teddy Bear Picnics organised by Team Teddy!, and the popular Pimms and Hymns event in July; St Mary's highlights have included the Lent Course, the (as always) rich liturgy and music during our Easter services provided by our very talented musicians and choir, and community celebrations of the Folk Festival and the

annual Lifeboat service which this year marked 150 years of the Swanage Lifeboat Station. It was also a great pleasure to welcome Stephen, the Bishop of Salisbury who preached at the Lifeboat service and preached and presided at the Patronal Festival at St Mary's that morning. As always we have maintained great relationships with other Swanage churches in Churches Together in Swanage events such as the Carnival tent and Carnival Praise service, the United Service and others.

We already have many more exciting projects, events and services planned for the coming year and so as this year draws to a close, I look forward in hope and thanksgiving that Christ, Emmanuel, is with us.

**From all of the us** in the Swanage and Studland Team Ministry we wish you a very Merry Christmas and a happy and peaceful New Year.

#### Swanage Parish Finances July - September 2025


This is the third quarter for which I have put together a summary of the financial transactions which have come through the parish office. I have included some categories which didn't occur previously, but which may be of interest. Some do not have a budget figure as they did not feature in the year's budget.


The total receipts in this quarter were £58,885 and the payments totalled £62,914. As in the previous quarters, the payments have exceeded the income and that is, unfortunately, the situation we have been in for the last few years. Although the members of our congregations have continued to give and our regular income this year appears to be somewhat increased on last year, we are still not "paying our way". Recently, Ian Bird and I went to a meeting of the diocesan synod at which it was said that if every member of the churches throughout the diocese gave about £2.50 extra each week, the diocesan deficit of £2million would disappear. The same principle applies to our parish finances and if everyone who is able gave something more each week, we would be able to reduce our expected deficit considerably.

By the time you read this, I will have reported to the PCC my estimate of how the figures will look at the end of 2025. In my last report in this magazine, I made a rough estimate of a deficit of £48,000. On more careful calculation, I'm sorry to say the expected figure is rather higher, perhaps over £50,000. We cannot afford to continue to keep having deficits of this order if we wish to see our Anglican churches survive and thrive. Nor would we want to have to report a deficit each year, as it necessitates taking money from our reserves and from recent legacies. The Finance and Stewardship Committee are modelling the next few years to see for how long we can maintain this level of depletion of our remaining available reserves and what actions we can take to mitigate this and I will say more when the results of this study have been reported to the PCC. We have already reduced our costs in some areas but some increase in giving by those who are able to, would help the situation considerably.



#### St Mary's Notes

We've had a busy November at St Mary's, beginning with our All Souls service A Service in which to Remember.... on the 2nd, the Town Remembrance Service on the 9th, and the hosting of Candles by the Sea on the 15th. We hosted this secular event for the first time; previously it has been on the beach and in the Bandstand. Although secular, Rector Ian introduced it and spoke at the end. The candle-lighting (of re-chargeable battery powered candles) was outside on the lawn. The Town Band played in the church, and St Mary's Choir sang hymns and religious choral pieces which attracted a good number to come into church and listen. The final event on November 29th is Handel's Messiah, performed by the Purbeck Arts Choir. Tickets have been selling fast!

Practical matters in hand include an estimate for repairs and redecorating the North Gallery. It can be seen where plaster is falling from the ceiling making it too risky to use the gallery. As it will be costly to erect the necessary scaffolding, it has been decided to make best use of it and decorate the Gallery while the scaffolding is in place. Asbestos guttering and downpipes have been replaced on the Rectory Classroom; the costly part of that is removal and disposal of the asbestos. A grant was obtained for replacement of the clock hands on the south side of the tower – you can look and see whether they have been put in place or not!

"Christmas comes but once a year....." begins an old rhyme. Just as well, some may say! Before that, we have Advent to allow us to prepare for Christmas. Over the four Sundays of Advent we light the Advent Wreath. This custom developed in Lutheran Germany and reached Britain in the 20th century. There are several ways that the five candles on the wreath can be used. At

**St Mary's we have three purple**, one pink, and one white candle, lit on successive Sundays to remind us first of the Patriarchs (Abrahm, Jacob, and Isaac), then the Prophets, then John the Baptist (pink for rejoicing) and then Mary, with the central white candle lit at Christmas. The choir sing Antiphons (Bible verses) before the lighting and special prayers of penitence are said.

Then on the Christmas Day we have joy and jubilation to celebrate the coming of Jesus into the world. Is this the most important event we celebrate, or is it Easter? Can there be one without the other?

In December, before Christmas, St Mary's will once again host Swanage Primary School's Christmas concert and on another day a Christingle Service will be held for the school. There's quite a programme of Christmas services across the Team and we have our usual quota at St Mary's. As last year, we'll have a handy postcard style leaflet listing everything. Let's hope we have lots of people coming to church over Christmas, first-timers especially welcome!

#### St Mary's clock

Many of you will I am sure be wondering what is happening with the hands on the south face of the clock at St Mary's. These had to be removed last year after the minute hand was dropping to 4 minutes past instead of 1 minute past when it moved past the 12 hour position. Upon inspection by Smith of Derby it was found that the thread in the hand nut had failed and the hour shaft had loosened considerably meaning the hands were at risk of falling on passers by! Over the past few months Revd Natalie and Revd Ian have therefore been working on an application for funding from ChurchCare (a Church of England body that gives grants for the conservation of historic churches) to repair the clock and replace the hands. It is with great joy and relief to report that our grant was successful and so we hope that the repairs will be completed and hands on the South face replaced in time for Christmas!



#### St Nicholas Studland News



"Are we nearly there yet?", "Are we nearly there yet", "How much further?", "When will we get there".....how many of our journeys have been punctuated by these insistent queries, coming from the back seat occupants of the car? Journeys can seem interminable, especially to children. I suspect adults too find waiting, or watching and waiting rather tiresome. In the Christian year, the weeks before Christmas, which we call Advent, are just such a watching and waiting time. Christians try to slow down a little, to take more time to be reflective. (Yes, I know, in the middle of the preparations for Christmas this is a bit tricky!) In part we're getting ourselves ready for the wonderful blaze of light that is Christmas day. This is the day we celebrate God's audacious rescue plan for humanity, a plan involving a baby born to a teenage mother in a makeshift location in an obscure corner of the Roman empire. This Advent season of quiet and reflection makes Christmas day itself even more intense, even more celebratory. But we also take a longer view in Advent, we look forward to a distant time when all of God's purposes come to fruition and all of time, past present and future will be bound up in his son, Jesus. We recognise that there is an arc, a trajectory to all of history, that it's not just some mish-mash of random events.

In St Nicholas Church our Advent preparations are marked by the lighting of the candles on the Advent wreath, one for each of the four Sundays of Advent. Three of the candles are purple, the colour of the reflective season of Advent (and, incidentally, Lent). One of the candles is rose pink, a colour associated with joy. (In the reflective seasons of Advent and Lent, the Christian calendar always sets apart one Sunday for a bit of celebration!). The culmination is the lighting of the central white candle on Christmas day. Our Sunday services follow the great Advent themes of watching and waiting. Maybe you could join us: give yourself a bit of a break from the helter-skelter preparations for Christmas. Of course you can also join us to sing carols and celebrate the Christmas story at our traditional service of Carols and Lessons on the 9th December at 18:30 and the Carols in the Barn at 15:30 on the 14th. We have a Midnight Mass service at 11:30 on Christmas Eve and a lively Family Communion at 10:00 on Christmas day. There's plenty of opportunity to be thoughtful and celebratory at St Nicholas!

The great thing about the Christian celebration of Christmas is that it does not stop on Boxing day. It goes on for another five weeks, taking us well into the New Year as we remember the arrival of the Wise Men from the East, and the gradual revealing that this baby born of Mary is no ordinary child. This child is the hope for the whole world, God's expression of love towards all humanity.

**All of us** at St Nicholas wish you a thoughtful Advent, a joyful Christmas and a hope-filled New Year.

#### Letter from the Bishop of Salisbury

**This December,** Carol and I will visit the tiny Channel Island of Alderney. It is a beautiful but a heavily fortified place having been both the first line of defence historically and an occupied and evacuated community. Having marked the 80th Anniversary of Liberation in Guernsey in May, Alderney has its own unique act of remembrance on 15th December known as Home Coming.

Alderney was not liberated because it had been evacuated. The people of Alderney could not return until later in the year when the war ended because the island was in such a state having been brutalised by the German occupation. In particular there were three concentration camps to provide forced labour. This December it is the 80th anniversary of the people of Alderney coming home which must have been both joyous and hugely challenging.

In these days of Advent we prepare ourselves for the coming home of our Saviour. Dark days prevail and I reflect upon what that darkness really means for those currently under oppression or war such as in Sudan and South Sudan. It can be difficult to imagine as we prepare for a happy English Christmas, what it must be like if your home is under threat.

#### 10th Purbeck Christmas Tree Festival at Emmanuel Baptist Church - Thur 11th -Sat 13th Dec

The final preparations are now taking place for this year's Christmas Tree Festival, which will actually mark our 10th year in Swanage. It moved from St James' Church, Kingston in 2015, and has continued to grow each year apart from the 'virtual Tree Festival of 2020', when we ran an on-line Festival with photos submitted of the many beautiful trees in people's homes, (covid restrictions). It begins on Thursday 11th December at 10am and runs until Saturday 13th December and is open until 6pm each evening'

This year we have over 45 local trees which will all be uniquely decorated, many with carefully crafted decorations, to celebrate Christmas Around the World. It is such a special time of year and there are many traditions right around the globe that have their roots in the Biblical Christmas Story, when the Lord Jesus was born just over 2000 years ago in Bethlehem.

There will be a full programme of live music, featuring various choirs, music groups, soloists and school groups, as well as storytelling for preschool groups. Each day the seasonal café will offer hot drinks, snacks, light lunches and a range of cakes and once again there will be an opportunity to dress up in the life size-stable.

On Sunday afternoon at 4pm, there is a quiet reflective Remembrance Service called 'Lights of Love', at which people can light candles to remember those who are no longer with us. Also we plan to have a large of Tree of Remembrance, on which anyone in the community can add colourful ribbons inscribed with names of friends and family whom they wish to remember.

There is no charge to visit the Christmas Tree Festival, but donations are welcome as this year we hope to support Julia's House, a hospice near Broadstone, also we aim to send funds towards a new helicopter for the Dorset Air Ambulance Service, which is often needed in this area.

There will be something for all ages, also the trees are decorated by people of all ages – from toddler groups to schools, estate agents, businesses and local charities, swimmers, choirs and care homes. Do come and enjoy the event and may it encourage the peace and hope that we long for in these days. May it be a time to reflect on how blessed we are and at the same time, help us to appreciate God's amazing global plan - the greatest gift of all – Jesus, our friend and Saviour.

We continue to embrace the notion of working with all people of goodwill to do God's work in the world. Our vision and fundamental principles for doing God's work will always underpin everything we do. Thank you to all who support us especially our wonderful volunteers.

#### **Hebrew Word of the Month**

#### Kavod (כַּבוֹד)

#### The Glory That Changes Everything

There are moments in life when words fall short — when we sense something so holy, so far beyond ourselves, that all we can do is stand still in awe. That's the heart of the Hebrew word Kavod (בוֹד), kah-VOHD) — glory, honor, weight, splendor.

#### Biblical Foundation

Kavod isn't just something that happens around us — it's something God reveals through us. When Yeshua (*the Hebrew name of Jesus*), came, the eternal Kavod of God took on flesh. "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we

"And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory (kavod), the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth." — John 1:14. Through Yeshua, Kavod became personal. He showed us that God's glory isn't a distant light — it's the face of a Savior who kneels to wash our feet, heals the brokenhearted, and dies for love. His glory isn't about power that overwhelms, but love that transforms.

#### **₩** Meaning of Kavod

In Hebrew, kavod comes from the root kaved (כָּבַד), which literally means "heavy." It's the idea that God's presence isn't light or fleeting — it carries substance, a holy weight that fills everything it touches. When Scripture says, "The glory (kavod) of the Lord filled the tabernacle" (Exodus 40:34), it means His presence became so real, so tangible, that no one could stand inside.

#### ☆ Why It Matters

This is the most amazing thing: that same Kavod now lives within us (those who are alive in Yeshua).

"Christ in you — the hope of glory." Colossians 1:27. When we walk with Yeshua, we carry His presence into the world — not as something heavy to bear, but as light that shines through every act of kindness, every word of grace, every heart made new.

Maybe you've been feeling empty, ordinary, or unseen. Remember: God's Kavod rests on you. His glory isn't found only in thunder or miracles — it's seen in every life surrendered to Him, every heart that reflects His love. When Yeshua's presence fills your life, you don't just witness His glory — you become a vessel of it.

#### 🙏 A Prayer

Lord Yeshua, thank You for filling my life with Your Kavod. Let Your glory shine through me in everything I do — not my strength or wisdom, but Your love living in me. May Your presence rest on me, changing the atmosphere wherever I go, until all the earth is filled with Your glory.

#### From Why Christmas? by Nicky Gumbel

At Christmas we celebrate the 'central event in the history of the earth, the very thing the whole story has been about' (C.S. Lewis). We celebrate the birth of Jesus. It is a day of great joy and celebration around the world.

**And yet**, in the midst of all the trappings and celebrations of Christmas, it can be easy to miss why Jesus' birth is so significant. The key to Christmas lies, not in the details of the shepherds' visit or the wise men's journey, but in the identity of the one whom they came to worship. In Jesus, *God became 'flesh' and 'made his dwelling among us' (John 1:14)*. Christmas is about Jesus!

**The 'baby Jesus'** is also the 'Lord of lords and King of kings,' Revelation 17.14, and in this passage we get a glimpse of the cosmic struggle between good and evil, as a vast array of powers and authorities line up against God. Yet we are reminded that, in the end, it is through the humility and self-sacrifice of 'the Lamb' that they are overcome.

**Jesus puts aside the glories of heaven** for a humble stall. As the carol, *Hark! The Herald Angels Sing,* puts it:

offspring of a virgin's womb.
Veiled in flesh the Godhead see;
hail the incarnate Deity,
pleased as man with man to dwell,
Jesus, our Emmanuel.
Hark! The herald angels sing,
'Glory to the new born King!'
