St Nicholas Parish News - Iceberg or Swan?

Dear Friends,

Well, you can pick your metaphor. It could be an iceberg, those masses of ice that float in cold waters, but what you see is only one tenth of what's there. The vast bulk of the iceberg is under the ocean, hidden from view. Or you could choose the swan metaphor. This graceful bird apparently gliding effortlessly across the lake, hardly causing a ripple on the water's surface. Underneath however is a different story. This swan is paddling rapidly and vigorously to keep itself moving. And so it is with a church like St Nicholas. The week-by-week worship, the weddings, the funerals, the baptisms, the special services, the Community Coffee, the Men's Breakfast, the Parish News that you are reading now, are just the tip of the iceberg, the swan gliding peacefully across the lake. But underneath all these events are many dedicated folks, working hard, the prayer and the finance to make all these activities possible.

This is my opportunity to thank those who do the hidden work of being church: to thank our Wardens, who have the legal oversight of the church and are directly responsible to the bishop; to thank our sides-persons who ensure a warm welcome and make sure that folk feel comfortable in St Nicholas; to thank the vergers who set up the church for worship, the lighting, heating, sound system, the wedding and funeral parking and seating; to thank the sacristan who lays out the altar and sacred vessels and ensures the appropriate colours are there for the church season; to thank those who set up and take down tables and chairs; to thank those who cook and prepare food and make coffee and teas and offer hospitality; to thank those who organise the church's administration; to thank those who take care of our safeguarding procedures; to thank the editor of this Parish News and all those who distribute it to the village; to thank those who keep the graveyard and church meadow trimmed and tidy; to thank the Parochial Church Council who consider and make decisions on behalf of the church; to thank our Team rector who has spiritual oversight of St Nicholas; to thank our readers and intercessors; to thank those who pay our bills for heating, lighting, insurance and maintenance; to thank all those who work unseen, especially those who pray for us.

Finally, I should mention money, after all, Jesus spoke about money on many occasions. Just to keep St Nicholas (a Grade 1 listed building) open and available for worship, for community and for quiet prayer and to keep the graveyard and meadow tidy and open, costs around £50,000 each year. If we add in the cost of ministry and Diocesan support, we're looking at another £23,000 or so. These sums must be raised each year by the church. Without them the activities that take place will diminish and in due course the church will cease to be open for worship.

So, as I said, there is much that goes on behind the scenes at St Nicholas, much to be thankful for and many people to be thanked. Maybe you could join us and become part of the iceberg or swan...your choice.

Church Alive Writes...

Who do you look like?

It's a well-known phenomenon that people often look like their pets. This picture of a lady and her dog is one of many, many you can find online where owners and their pets seem to share more than a few similarities.

I *hope* I don't look like either my black labrador or my black cat, but with the amount of hair that they shed, it is always possible I look more like them than I intend!



Perhaps more understandable is people looking like their parents. Don't Reese Witherspoon and her daughter Ava Phillippe look remarkably alike!

Perhaps you also look like one of your parents, or maybe you share some family mannerisms? Ever spotted someone laughing just like their dad? (not always something they are keen to discover!)

I frequently find myself saying a phrase that sounds *just* like my mum. And I guess it isn't surprising, is it, given we generally spend a lot of time together as families when we are growing up and those things rub off on each other. Family likeness can be seen in lots of different ways, whether or not it is something we are happy with or not!

BUT HOW ABOUT THE FAMILY LIKENESS FOR THOSE OF US WHO CALL OURSELVES CHRISTIANS, THOSE WHO ARE PART OF THE FAMILY OF GOD, THE CHURCH? HOW IS OUR FAMILY LIKENESS DOING?

Back in Genesis 1v27, we are told that humankind is made in the image of God – so the very essence of being human is to be like our heavenly Father. No doubt we can think of different ways in which humanity is made in the image of God,

be it creative, moral or spiritual, and over the years, scholars have debated exactly what this phrase does and doesn't mean in great detail.

When we get to the New Testament, we meet the man Jesus. And in doing so, we discover that we also meet God himself for as Paul tells us in Colossians 1v15 *"The Son is the image of the invisible God"*, or as Hebrews 1v3 *"The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being"* (emphasis mine). Clearly more than a passing family resemblance.

And as we also discover, part of the work of the 3rd member of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit, is to be at work within us, to align us also with the family likeness. 2 Corinthians 3v18 *"And we all...are being transformed into his [the Lord's] image with ever-increasing glory"*. Who are we to look like? God!

Now I don't know how you feel you're doing with that right now? For me that still sounds like a big challenge despite following Jesus for about 40 years so far. I've made progress, but there is still considerable way to go. How about you? But one of the key things I've found God uses to reshape and mould me, is His Word, the Bible. That's why over the next month we are all going to step aside from our regular Bible reading plans and look at together – across all 4 of our churches in Swanage and Studland - at a particular aspect of God's character that we believe he wants to challenge us in – the characteristic of GENEROSITY.

Our series is called GENEROUS GOD – GENEROUS PEOPLE, and we are going to spend four weeks looking in more detail at the very essence of God's nature and why Generosity really is at the heart of the God we follow and what that generosity might look like in practice for those of us who bear his name and are seeking to be transformed into his image.

We won't just look at financial generosity – although that will definitely feature. Given the number of times that Jesus talks about money in the gospel accounts, we can be very sure that God is profoundly interested in how we chose to manage our finances. But having a generous life is a lot more than simply money handling, and our great desire is that over this month, we might let the Word and Spirit of God challenge our hearts and minds and transform our lives that Our Heavenly family resemblance might be more ever more striking.

Planet Purbeck are involved in many local projects including working with children and local schools, the NHS Thrive Health Initiative, river and water quality improvements and Trees for Dorset.

We live in an area with many successful nature initiatives such as the beaver introduction, ospreys returning and the biodiversity at Durlston, it is important that we experience nature and we can care about what we know and drive projects for areas of improvements such as our rivers.

Local action is key; we cannot wait for international directives.

Luke also spoke about how we can all be eco-friendlier in our lives. There are banks, phone networks & search engines who are not for profit providers and contribute large sums on nature projects. Planet Purbeck are looking to connect further with Studland to work together on local initiatives.

STUDLAND GARDENING ASSOCIATION

Is “Flaming June” an actual thing? Let’s presume it is and get our gardens ready for some lovely hot weather. Make sure your water butts are full, even consider installing a second or third, plants prefer rain water to tap water and of course it’s more sustainable (only water succulents with rain water).

Mulching flower and vegetable beds really pays dividends, don’t skimp and apply a thick layer, it not only stops the roots from drying out it helps to keeps the weeds down. Stake tall or floppy plants like dahlias and some type of hydrangeas, tall perennials like lupins and delphiniums. Although No Mow May has finished, consider leaving a patch uncut to encourage wildlife. Prune spring flowering shrubs, cut out dead wood and reduce if they have grown too big.

Now is the time to start thinking of what you would like to enter into the summer show which is on Saturday 1st August.

Updates from the National Trust:

First seahorse of the season!

There was excitement on the training day for the new volunteer divers at Studland Bay – when the first seahorse of the year was recorded!

Each summer, around 40 volunteers, from students to experienced divers, help count and photograph seahorses, while checking the health of the seagrass. Their findings



are fed back to the Studland Bay Marine Partnership, a group of organisations – including the National Trust – which works to protect the precious underwater meadows. Our eco-moorings enable boats to anchor without damaging the seagrass, and the mooring fees go straight back into the project.

Huge thanks to Southampton University and The Seahorse Trust for leading the training – and to all the volunteers for giving their time to help conserve this rare habitat.

Then there were six...

Great news - all six puffins are back at Dancing Ledge! We were concerned because so many puffins washed up dead on beaches last winter, and if we lose any more of our colony, it's a step to extinction here. But all three pairs back and have been showing signs of building and egg-incubation.

We are indebted to the dedicated volunteers who are out there in all weathers – and all hours – monitoring progress. We won't know the results of trail cam monitoring until the cameras retrieved at the end of the season.

Cattle helping conservation

Please be aware that cattle are now grazing on Studland Heath, on either side of Ferry Road. Cattle do an amazing job in maintaining our wildlife habitats: They use their long tongues to pull up coarse vegetation; this allows a wider variety of plants to grow. They create areas of bare soil which are important basking sites for insects and reptiles. They open up marshy areas, allowing wetland wildlife to

thrive. Their dung provides food for beetles and flies, which in turn feed many birds and bats. They push through thick scrub and keep it open.

If you see cattle when out in the countryside, please:

- Don't feed them because it encourages them to follow people.
- Give them plenty of space, especially when there are calves.
- Keep dogs on leads where cattle are grazing (the exception is if the cattle approach you, then let your dog off the lead so you can both move to safety.)

Update from Studland Parish Council May 2026

The Annual Parish Meeting was held on May 18th. The main item of concern to residents were the changes proposed to charging of tolls by the Ferry Company. Rosie Kean, a Director of the Ferry Company, and Wayne Row, the General Manager, attended and were able to answer questions. In summary:

- The existing systems provider for the Ferry tolls is withdrawing service on 30th June. The Ferry Company want to replace the existing system with a cashless one (the Ferry Company went cashless on 01st April 2026), based on ANPR (automatic number plate recognition). The Ferry Company are in discussion with two suitable providers but as of the meeting have not agreed contracts with a preferred supplier.
- 8 toll booth staff are affected, in that their jobs are at risk. However, the Ferry Company is trying to retain some employees by redeployment to other roles in the business.
- Once the new systems are in place, residents will need to register for a new ANPR account and then all existing SFTC Passes will be automatically transferred to their corresponding ANPR-linked accounts as tokens.
- Paper tickets can already be converted into SFTC Passes; once the ANPR system is live, paper ticket holders will have until 31st March 2027 to bring their tickets to the Ferry Office so they can be added to their ANPR account as tokens.
- SFTC Passes will retain the remainder of their original 2 year validity; tokens created from the paper tickets will each have a 2 year expiry from the date they are created i.e. until 31st March 2029. When transferring to the new ANPR tokens, the Ferry Company is saying that proof of purchase will be needed.

Residents at the meeting were particularly concerned about paper tickets: when these were bought, there was no expiry date indicated. Residents feel that it would be illegal for the Ferry Company now to limit the duration of their use to only 2 years. Residents asked that the Ferry Company reconsider their proposals here and allow for the continuation of the existing terms i.e. no expiry date.

Other questions were asked: for example, what would happen if a foot passenger or cyclist did not have a bank card with them? The Ferry Company's response was that – at least initially – cash would be accepted. However, cash is no longer accepted at the ferry, so the new ANPR system does not affect foot passengers or cyclists.

Given that these changes are imminent, residents asked that the Ferry Company provide detailed communications on the proposed changes. The Ferry Company said that this will be forthcoming and in good time.

Another item raised by a resident was: if the Knoll House Hotel gets its planning permission, large sections of it will be demolished, and will need removing. The resident wanted to know: how will all this material be removed, and where will it be taken? SPC will ask the hotel to come to a future meeting to explain their proposals.

Another issue raised was about speeding jet skis: David Battle responded saying it was the job of the Marine Police to control this, and asked that residents and visitors complain to the Marine Police.

Following the Annual Parish Meeting, SPC held the Annual Parish Meeting. It is at this meeting of the Parish Council each year that the members elect the Chair and Vice Chair, and appoint members to committees and external bodies.

Election of officers: Nick Boulter was re-elected as Chairman, and Steve Smith was re-elected as Vice-Chairman.

Moving on to the main SPC agenda, SPC voted to re-adopt the General Power of Competence.

No National Trust report had been submitted, and no National Trust representative was present.

CLlr Ben Wilson was not able to attend until the end of the meeting, having to attend another meeting first: however, Ben had submitted a report:

- Consultation on a plan for a 20mph speed limit in Studland will be held in the Autumn.

- Repatching works will take place on the B3351 near the golf club, and near the Water Adventure Park.

3 planning applications had been received, all relating to the National Trust's plan to introduce ANPR parking equipment to Marine Beach, South Beach, and to Shell Bay. No objections were raised.

On crime, an honesty box had been stolen from the front of a house in School Lane.

Under Officer reports, Mark Elliott reported that he was attending a screening of the "People's Emergency Briefing on Climate and Nature" in Swanage, and that he had started his role of Studland Care Officer – in Steve Smith's absence.

Lyn Hool reported that 2 Community Speed Watch sessions had taken place over the past month. Fewer vehicles were caught speeding, so hopefully drivers are getting the message about keeping to the speed limit in Studland.

The Clerk presented the Internal Audit report for the year ending 31st March 2026. Some small recommendations had been made by the Auditor. The Clerk said he was actioning all of these.

The Clerk also had circulated quotes for the replacement of the current SPC website with one fully compliant with modern regulations; SPC agreed to a preferred supplier.

In the absence of Cllr Ben Wilson at this stage of the meeting, it was decided to defer until our next meeting discussion on proposals for double yellow lines along Heath Green Road, and also about consultation plans for a 20mph speed limit in Studland.

QUESTIONS 3. WHY DO SO MANY BAD THINGS HAPPEN?

No-one is immune from suffering. Everyone at some time in their life experiences pain or difficulty: from losing a job or the breakdown of a relationship to serious illness, or the loss of a loved one. Coming to terms with the fact that bad things happen is part of being human.

Not only do we see suffering on a personal level, but we also see it on a global scale: famine, war, injustice, extreme poverty, children suffering with terminal illness, natural disasters... The sheer scale can seem overwhelming. It's not unreasonable to ask that if God is good and loves us, as Christianity teaches, why does he allow this bad stuff to happen?

God is good: Christianity teaches that God is the essence of all that is good. The Bible tells us that evil and suffering was not part of his original plan. When he made the world and created humanity to live in it, everything was perfect. There are different ideas which help Christians reconcile the existence of a good God with a beautiful but imperfect world. One is that God has a different perspective to us – he has a longer view of human history. Because of that, at some point in the future, the bad things that we endure now will make sense and ultimately lead to something good. Christians are hopeful. We don't pretend that that positive thinking will make all the bad things go away or shield us from them. But we have a hope that, whatever is happening now, ultimately God will make all things right in the end.

Humans cause suffering: A second way to reconcile the apparent contradiction of a good God allowing suffering is to remember that God gave people free will. God created humanity with the ability to make its own decisions. We are free to do good but also to do evil. Some people choose to murder, steal, abuse, and exploit, irrespective of the pain and suffering they will cause. In a strange way, the question: 'Why do so many bad things happen?' actually points to the existence of God. Christians believe that human beings have an instinctive sense of things being unfair, unjust, wrong or just bad, because there is something inside us linking us to God, to a sense of what good is - and therefore how a good world should be.

God is not distant from our pain: The Bible is like the handbook for Christianity. It tells us what God is like: that he is perfect, loving, eternal and all-powerful; that he will ensure that evil does not win; that he will bring about justice and peace in the end. It also promises that, in the here and now, he will comfort those who mourn. God understands the pain and suffering of human life because he saw it for himself. About 2,000 years ago God came to live among us in human form as Jesus Christ. The New Testament part of the Bible tells how Jesus befriended people who experienced suffering, bereavement, exclusion, pain and illness. He showed them love and compassion. Jesus suffered himself. He was betrayed, arrested, tortured and Crucified. He knew what was going to happen but allowed it to unfold because he knew it was part of a bigger plan.

Linda's Story:

Linda Jacson wrote this charming account of her life, as a daughter of a farm worker raised in Studland in the mid 1920's/30's for her grand-daughter.

As editor, I have been asked to share her memories here for readers...

Continuation...

There were no buses to the village, no daily newspapers and no Sunday papers, and if one wanted to go to the cinema in Shaftesbury, one had to get enough people together to hire a taxi. One night we got 10 in the taxi, much to the driver's annoyance.

To get home for the weekend I would have to get a bus to Fontmell Magna, change at Shaftesbury, change at Poole and then get a bus from Swanage.

One day I was sitting on a fallen tree, chopping old twigs and fallen branches when I felt the axe go down on my finger. I went to the surgery in Fontmell Magna to have it bandaged. It was difficult milking cows with a bandaged finger.

There was a bit of harvesting done. My job was to stand 4 stacks together like a wigwam. It was hot and scratchy work.

Potatoes next. I had two weeks on potato picking. One picked the potatoes off the ground into a bucket, then tipped them from the bucket into a sack. I should have reported my boss because he lent me to his son for potato picking, the Land Army did not allow that.

The next two weeks were easier as we had some Italian prisoners of war to help. One of them, Gino, took to me and helped me with my lines and putting them into sacks. Gino could not speak any English. Two more weeks of potato picking, this time for the farmer's son-in-law. I lost one stone in weight in those six weeks. On the Thursday before we finished, Gino gave me a letter from his commanding officer. In it, it said Gino wanted to marry me. Would I write to him when the war was over, we could get married? I sent him a letter with explanations.

be Wildfire Aware

If British Summer Time and warmer days mean you will be visiting one of Dorset and Wiltshire's local heathlands or outdoors spaces to enjoy the wildlife and wilderness, please take a picnic.

Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service (DWFRS) is encouraging residents and visitors to bring a picnic and not a barbecue when out and about. Warmer and breezy weather increases the risk of accidental or deliberate fires in our open spaces.

A wildfire can escalate quickly, so we are asking everyone to follow some simple steps:

- If you are enjoying our open spaces stay alert for signs of fire—smoke, heat, or unusual smells. If you spot anything worrying, call 999 immediately. Consider downloading and using What3Words to identify your exact location.
- Avoid having open fires or using barbecues in the countryside. Disposable barbecues and campfires are banned in many parts of Dorset.
- Extinguish smoking materials properly, and don't throw cigarette ends on the ground or out of car windows – take your litter home.
- If you're at the beach, don't set off flares, have campfires or light barbecues as these can easily lead to gorse and foliage on the cliffs catching fire.

You can also help by reporting any anti-social behaviour on our heaths to CrimeStoppers by calling 0800 555 111 (100% Anonymous).

Landowners and land managers are also advised, where possible, to be prepared for fires and ensure that fire breaks are cut and well maintained with any cut grasses and vegetation removed from the site.
