


#### St Nicholas Parish News

Dear Friends.

One feature of Facebook that I particularly like is when it brings up photos from the past, with the tag line "Eight years ago" or whatever. It is good fun to look back on these pictures. Remembering is important. Do you remember any poems? Perhaps you learnt them at school or maybe later in life, or maybe you heard one at a wedding, tracked it down and learnt it. One of my favourites is by Edward Thomas. It is a poem about remembering, recalling a short stop at a small railway station in the heat of summer;

Yes. I remember Adlestrop—
The name, because one afternoon
Of heat the express-train drew up there
Unwontedly. It was late June.

The steam hissed. Someone cleared his throat.

No one left and no one came On the bare platform. What I saw Was Adlestrop—only the name

And willows, willow-herb, and grass, And meadowsweet, and haycocks dry, No whit less still and lonely fair Than the high cloudlets in the sky.

And for that minute a blackbird sang Close by, and round him, mistier, Farther and farther, all the birds Of Oxfordshire and Gloucestershire.

In the church, November is a month for remembering. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> we take time to remember our loved ones who have died, celebrating their lives, reminding ourselves of hope and expressing our sorrow. On the 9<sup>th</sup> the whole nation will gather to recall the great price paid for our freedom by those who lost their lives in the two World Wars and in subsequent conflicts. We shall remember and we shall pledge ourselves to learn from the past and look for ways of peace. Here in St Nicholas Studland on the 16<sup>th</sup> we shall remind ourselves of the importance of treating everyone with respect, honour, and kindness as we give thanks for the work of our Safeguarding Officer and for the Diocesan Safeguarding team. The 23<sup>rd</sup> see us celebrating the feast of Christ the King, not a king in an imperial and aggressive military sense, but a king of self-sacrificing love, whose glory fills the universe. And finally, on the 30<sup>th</sup> we commence our countdown to Christmas with Advent Sunday, as once again we recall God's astonishing story of redemption and love, centred in a baby born in Bethlehem.

So much remembering! But it is important to remember. The philosopher George Santayana said, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it." Remembering as far as we are able is helpful. Our memories shape

who we are and how we respond to the world. They contain our joys and, yes, our sorrows: they bring us warnings and encouragements. Each week in church we do a lot of remembering, especially during the Communion Service, we repeat Christ's words to his disciples at the Last Supper: "Do this in remembrance of me." Yes, it is good to remember.

#### Church Alive Writes...

A new Archbishop of Canterbury (finally!)

Many people have already noted the contrast between the 16 days it took the Roman Catholic church to elect a new Pope after the death of Pope Francis in April 2025 and the almost 11 months since Archbishop Justin announced his resignation, it has taken, the Church of England has a new Archbishop of Canterbury designate. And in case we get carried away with the speed, she won't officially start her new role, until she is formally installed in a service in March 2026! (yes, I am being cheeky!)

Many might see this delay as unhelpful, even unnecessary, but unlike the Roman Catholic church, leadership in the Church of England is rather more collaborative and a lot less top-down. Lord Evans, Chair of the Crown Nominations Commission for Canterbury, spoke of how they had "heard the voices of thousands of people as they expressed their hopes for this nomination." Much of the delay was to take real time to listen to the individual voices of God's church.

This sense of listening is echoed in Bishop Sarah statement where she said:

"As I respond to the call of Christ to this new ministry, I do so in the same spirit of service to God and to others that has motivated me since I first came to faith as a teenager. At every stage of that journey, through my nursing career and Christian ministry, I have learned to listen deeply – to people and to God's gentle prompting – to seek to bring people together to find hope and healing. (my emphasis)."

So, whilst it has been frustrating to wait, let's appreciate the time taken to listen and reflect, something I myself often need to remember to take proper time to do. Perhaps that is something you can relate to as well? Our verse for 2025 up at All Saints has been "Keep in step with the Spirit" Galatians 5v25, and I am finding that more and more that God is in less of a hurry than I am.

Now, whilst there will no doubt be many people who are uncomfortable with this appointment, (yes, the Church of England does incorporate people with a variety of views on many things, including the leadership of women), there will be many of us who are rejoicing. No prizes for guessing how I feel!

But actually, my real hope comes from in hearing how people describe her, as a person of "huge courage, wisdom, integrity, and experience", "great compassion and courage", and showing "the greatest respect for the different theological traditions." Quite apart from the issues that arise from being a female

Archbishop in a church far from united on the role of women, she faces a deeply challenging to do list; divisions over sexuality, the rise of Christian nationalism, criticisms on the financial reparations of slavery let alone the dwindling congregations and exponential costs of historical buildings.

Where to start!? Bishop Sarah's statement continued,

"I want, very simply, to encourage the Church to continue to grow in confidence in the Gospel, to speak of the love that we find in Jesus Christ and for it to shape our actions."

Which is a great reminder for us too. We do face enormous issues, both globally, locally and I am aware, many of us personally, but the way to tackle these issues starts by going back to the gospel – to meeting the person of Jesus, discovering for ourselves his love and forgiveness, grace and truth, hope and purpose and inviting other people to meet him too.

How are we going to renew our efforts to **Make Jesus known** in our town and spheres of influence this Autumn? It's so easy to slip into a life that is focused almost entirely on ourselves and our families, and leave making Jesus known to someone else. But I suspect that isn't what "keeping in step with the Spirit" means in practice. Who has God laid on your heart to engage with? If you're not sure, why not pray and ask Him. The next few months bring with them many different opportunities to invite someone to join us at a church service, whether it is to remember a loved one, or service personnel, or looking further ahead, dare I mention the "Christmas" word!

Let's join in the heartbeat of our new Archbishop designate and speak of the love we find in Jesus Christ and allow that love to shape our actions.

### **Updates from the National Trust**

Middle Beach transformed! Thanks to perfect weather and sea

conditions, work at Middle Beach was competed ahead of time. The old sea

defences and concrete slipway have been removed, and the cliff has been reprofiled to make a more gradual slope. The cove is now being left for nature to reshape – but we hope you agree, it already looks so much better without the man-made structures. We're expecting quite rapid



adjustment of the shoreline initially as it moves to a more natural alignment. For that reason, this section of the beach will remain closed. We are also monitoring the material that's washing out of the cliff (the area was once used for landfill) – we've had everything from bricks, blocks and metal pipes, to ceramics and bottles.

We're really excited to see our long-term vision for Middle Beach coming to fruition – a beautiful cove that people can enjoy and where wildlife can thrive.

Hamza's Hidden Wild Isles: Did you watch this stunning nature series on the BBC? Wildlife cameraman Hamza Yassin takes us on a tour of the hidden nature of the UK. In the first episode alone (spring), there was incredible footage including the courtship displays of great crested grebes, hares boxing, nightingales singing (they have a repertoire of up to 1,000 different phrases learned from other birds) and numerous adders curled up together to bask. And guess what? Almost all the species featured in the show can be seen here in Purbeck! If you missed the series, you can still catch it on BBC iPlayer.

**Going for gold:** There's no mistaking this gorgeous bird with its bright red face and yellow wing patch. The goldfinch is a very sociable bird, often seen in large flocks, filling the air with its melodic twittering song.

They are specialist feeders, their fine beaks allowing them to extract otherwise inaccessible seeds from thistles and teasels. If you want to attract them into your garden, try cultivating thistles and teasels, or putting niger and sunflower seeds in your bird feeder.

## **Swanage Medical Practice Patient Participation Group Winter 2025 Flu Vaccination Campaign**

It's that time of year again! We urge everyone who is eligible to book their flu jabs as soon as possible - if they have not already done so. Those eligible for a flu vaccination this Autumn include:

- People aged 65 or older
- People aged under 65 with health problems (in a high-risk group)
- People aged under 65 who have a learning disability
- Children aged 2 to 16
- People living in care homes
- Frontline health or social care workers
- People who live with someone with a weak immune system
- Those who are the main carer of an older or disabled person, carer's allowance

If you have not already been invited to attend the Surgery for your flu jab, please ring the Surgery to book an appointment as soon as possible.

Please note that Dorset HealthCare will be taking care of flu vaccinations for housebound patient and care home residents, as well as school age children. Pregnant women will be offered a flu jab through their Maternity Service.

#### Winter 2025 COVID-19 vaccination Campaign

We also urge everyone who is eligible to book their COVID-19 vaccination as soon as possible. This Autumn, those eligible for a free NHS COVID-19 vaccination include:

- People aged 75 or over (including those who will be 75 by 31 January 2026)
- People living in care homes for older adults
- People aged 6 months to 74 years who have a weakened immune system.

#### from Council **Update** Studland Parish November 2025

Studland Parish Council (SPC) met on October 20th. All councillors were present, except Lyn Hool. Also present

were Cllr Ben Wilson of Dorset Council, Emma Wright and Hannah Newton, of the National Trust (NT).

During the Public Participation section, a resident raised concerns – on behalf of others - that as mobile signals in the village were poor, some villagers might miss out on alerts in the case of fires, or other emergencies; clarity was also sought on where the hubs would be situated. Cllr Mark Elliott said he and the Resilience team were aware of these concerns, and would address them in the plan he is developing. Mark also asked that the concerned residents be told that he will be at the Table Top sale in the Village Hall on November 22<sup>nd</sup>, and will be available to speak to any residents with concerns there.

Emma and Hannah gave updates on behalf of the NT:

- \*A new pay and display scheme, linked to ANPR, will be installed at Middle and Knoll Beaches. The JustPark app can be used. Residents with a pass will need to register their number plate at the Visitor Centre when the scheme goes live.
- \*From Oct 27<sup>th</sup>, the car parks will be open from 9.00am to 4.30pm.
- \*The number of fires / barbecues on the beach last summer was down a lot on previous years. However, there were more incidents reported of dogs off the lead. Camper vans parking overnight on Ferry Road had increased.
- \*The works to remove gabions and other sea defences at Middle Beach are largely completed. The NT expects the sea to erode the cliff face back progressively so that much of Middle Beach car park will be lost over the next 20 -30 years.

Cllr Ben Wilson gave updates on behalf of Dorset Council:

- \*The ban on overnight parking on Ferry Road will now be enforced: enforcement officers visited and fined vehicles camping overnight 3 times a week in September, and 2 nights a week in October. Enforcement will be ramped up over the October Half Term period, and then less frequently until March, when it will be ramped up again. This is part of an initial contract with an enforcement team that Dorset Council has agreed; a longer-term contract will be agreed in the Spring. This is a major achievement for Cllr Ben Wilson.
- \*Dorset council is offering grants of up to £5,000 to support not-for-profit groups delivering arts, heritage, sports, and community events in Dorset.
- \*The deadline for responses to the Local Plan have been extended to  $31^{\rm st}$  October.
- \*Dorset Council has become the 100<sup>th</sup> place in the UK to become an Age-friendly Community.

Three planning applications had been received:

- \*The Knapp: SPC had no objections to these plans, but supported comments by the Conservation Officer that the red brick be used and displayed, not smooth stucco render, to be more in keeping with surrounding houses.
- \*Valley View Glebe: there were no objections.
- \*Church Cottage: this was not formally on the agenda, as the plans had arrived too late. SPC initially see no reason to object. Formal consideration will however be given after the next SPC.

On Highways, the incidents at the Swanage Road / Corfe Road triangle intersection, will be reported by the Clerk.

No incidents of crime had been reported.

The Clerk had been asked by a resident for an update on the stolen post box from Agglestone Road. The clerk had contacted the Royal Mail to report this, and to request a replacement box. However, the Royal Mail, despite being sympathetic, has taken no action to replace the post box.

Under Officer reports, Chrissie Neville reported that she and the Voluntary Tree Wardens had gathered details on the trees with TPOs (tree protection orders) in

the village, plus details on the evaluation method used to assess if a tree should have a TPO. This method – TEMPO (tree evaluation method for preservation orders) will be used as guide in Studland. Other guides also exist to assess the life expectancy of different types of trees, and whether these get classified as Ancient, Veteran or Notable trees and should have TPOs applied. Chrissie will provide a longer update in the Parish News in the future.

Other Officers also gave updates:

- \*David Battle reported that the eco-buoys will be removed shortly to be cleaned, and then replaced in the Spring.
- \*Stephen Yeoman had submitted statements to the Local Plans and Local Transport Plans on our behalf: his comments highlighted the absence of any mention of the need for improvements to no.50 bus service, to the Ferry service, or to parking issues on Ferry Road.
- \*Steve Smith reported that maintenance work around the village was ongoing; he also said that the new bench to commemorate Peter Bowyer will be delivered soon.
- \*Tim Yeandle said that he received a positive response from Stephen Mepham of Dorset Highways to a request to place a sign on Swanage Road, at the top of Heath Green Road, to advise walkers not to walk down Swanage Road. Tim said he had also received a request from a resident that we place name plates on some of the footpaths in the village that have local names e.g. Love Lane, Windmill Lane. He is going to progress that.
- \*Mark Elliott said that he was fine-tuning the Resilience Plans, and these will be published soon. As mentioned above, he will be available to discuss these plans with any resident at the Table Top sale on November 22<sup>nd</sup> in the Village Hall.
- \*In Lyn's absence, Chrissie Neville gave an update on the Community Speed Watch: the team had met twice, and was joined by the head of Dorset Police Speed watch who gave very favourable feedback on the excellent work done by our team.

It was agreed to pay all invoices.

Peter Hammond has asked the NT for the relevant manager there to discuss financing works to the pond, and their responsibility as the owner.

We are entering the period when SPC has to plan projects and expenditures for 2026/27, and the precept required. The Clerk has started worked on this, and the SPC Finance Committee will meet on December 8th to go through the details.

The next meeting of SPC will be on November 17<sup>th</sup>. Items for the agenda will include: an update on the pond, a Christmas Tree for the Green, and feedback from a "Future Dorset" meeting.

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### What's the Big Idea? Introducing the Books of the Bible:

#### An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: 2 Corinthians

'For anyone operating under the naïve presumption that joining a Christian church is a good way to meet all the best people and cultivate smooth social relations, a reading of Paul's Corinthian correspondence is the prescribed cure' (Eugene Peterson).

Paul sent four letters to the Corinthian church: 1 Cor.5:9; 1 Cor; a 'severe' letter 2 Cor. 2:3–4; and 2 Cor sent around AD 55 around a year after 1 Corinthians. Paul had a number of reasons for writing this letter: To express the joy he felt at their response to his painful letter (1:3-4; 7:8-9,12-13); To share his troubles in Asia (1:8-11) and why he changed his travel plans (1:12-2:4); To ask them to forgive those who had offended him (2:5-11); To warn them not to be "yoked together with unbelievers" (6:14-7:1); To explain the true nature of Christian ministry (2:14-7:4); To encourage them in giving and completing the collection for the Jerusalem Christians (chs. 8-9); To deal with the opposition (chs. 10-13) and prepare for his coming visit (12:14; 13:1-3,10).

In this very personal letter Paul defends his leadership against accusations of inconsistencies in motives and credentials. A major theme concerns the relationship between suffering and the power of the Spirit. His opponents argued that Paul suffered too much to be a Spirit-filled apostle.

Paul responds by saying that his sufferings embody Christ's death and his endurance reveals God's glory: 'He said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for My power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore, I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me.' (2 Cor 12:9).

#### An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: Galatians

Paul's letter to the Galatians has been described as the 'Magna Carta of Christian Liberty', because it emphasises the freedom that we have through faith in Jesus Christ. Paul vigorously defends the truth that people are justified ('made right with God') by faith in Jesus Christ alone. Our standing with God is not determined by what we do, but by dependence on what Christ has done. It is generally believed that Paul wrote this letter in 48/9AD to the churches in the southern area of Galatia, which he planted on his first missionary journey. It was written before the Council of Jerusalem (Acts 15), making it the earliest of Paul's letters. Paul is dealing with Jewish-Christians (or Judaizers) who were advocating ceremonial practices of the Jewish law, including circumcision, in addition to faith in Christ as the means of salvation. They were undermining Paul's authority as an apostle, by asserting that his gospel didn't agree with the apostles in Jerusalem. In response, Paul defends his apostolic authority and presents the true gospel, by emphasising the unique importance of Christ and His cross in salvation. He argues that 'a person is justified not by the works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ' (2:16). He appeals especially to the examples of Abraham (3:6-9) and Hagar and Sarah (4:21-31), who stand in contrast as being a 'slave' under the law and 'free' in Christ. 'It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery.' (5:1). We are justified through faith alone and it is by faith alone that we live out our new life in the freedom of the Spirit.

Summer 2025 was highly successful season for the newly reformed Studland Cricket Club. Now a social team, the current incarnation springs from the former Corfe Castle Veteran's Cricket team which, in both guises, has now been active for well over a decade. 




A Year to Slow Down - a Christian guide to embracing handmade & homegrown, By Rachel Bearn.

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
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
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
