1st Reading: Ephesians 3, 1 - 12

Gospel Reading: Matthew 2, 1 - 12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.' When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah^c was to be born. They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, 'Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage.' When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

REFLECTION

Isaiah 60:1-6 Ephesians 3:1-12 Matthew 2:1-12

Matthew's gospel is structured with breathtaking precision in sequences and an overall circular shape. We learn to interpret his stories by their mirror-image. A little after the beginning, a little before the end, Matthew places episodes of shocking homicidal violence – the massacre of the innocents, the crucifixion of Jesus – ironically attached to claims of kingship of Israel. We recognise the lust for power – evil - easily enough: we hear daily on the news of rulers and would-be rulers who massacre people to assert their power. We may even recognise it in ourselves.

What makes Matthew's gospel stories good news?

Matthew's quote from Jeremiah about Rachel weeping for her children and refusing comfort seems appositely bleak , but Jeremiah is breaking breathtaking good news: God will rescue Rachel and her children. *'I have loved thee with an everlasting love... Again I will build thee.'* *'Their soul shall be as a watered garden, and they shall not sorrow any more at all. Then shall the virgin rejoice in the dance, both young men and old together, for I will turn their mourning into joy, and will comfort them.'* *'Refrain thy voice from weeping, and thy eyes from tears.'* Rachel who was buried not with her people but as an outsider, by the wayside, will be restored to them, with her children. God's loving covenant with Israel will be renewed.

Isaiah's rising star, also alluded to by Matthew, comes from a chapter probably written after the promise had been realised and the exiles were back in Jerusalem. Israel's glory is restored; a dazzling glory that draws in the gentiles – the whole world. The promise made to Abraham that his children would outnumber the stars in the sky and the sands of the sea is fulfilled. Matthew doesn't say that the wise men (not *kings* – those are Herods) are gentiles: their gifts certainly represent Wisdom and worship in the first, destroyed temple.

That God's loving wisdom is universal but revealed definitively in a fragile human being's birth, death and resurrection is 'the mystery' or blinding glory that stopped St Paul in his own homicidal tracks. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, Paul understands that the birth, death and resurrection of a man he despised was the all-conquering love-gift of God's self to the world – creative love exceeding anything the prophets could have imagined.
